We have all heard of critical safety items missed during pre-flight, and may have experienced a personal lapse. Please take the time for a thorough and effective pre-flight inspection every time you fly.

Field Trip

Federal Aviation Administration Air Traffic Control Center, Vint Hill Farms Station, Virginia May 6, 2007 By: Jim Birnbaum/Pete Bastien

We would first like to thank Mel Bearns for coordinating this tour with his friend Mark Nesfeder and to thank Mark for taking the time off position to conduct the tour. While we had a small turnout, the tour itself was interesting and provided insight into how air traffic is managed. The Potomac Tracon facility is located at Vint Hill Farms and has been in operation for less than 10 years. It provides approach and departure control services for all air traffic arriving or departing Dulles, Ronald Reagan, Baltimore, Andrews, and Richmond. Formerly, each of these airports had its own approach and departure control facility located at the airport. Combining the individual facilities into one centrallylocated facility results in a more efficient use of people and technology.

Any aircraft approaching one of these airports must contact Approach Control for that airport on the appropriate frequency. At some point near the airport, usually when the aircraft is established on its final approach, Approach Control will instruct the aircraft to contact the tower, which then issues landing instructions. When departing the airport, it happens in reverse: the control tower issues takeoff instructions, and shortly after takeoff, will advise the aircraft to contact Departure Control for further instructions. At some pre-determined distance from the airport, Departure Control will hand the aircraft off to an enroute facility (Washington Center, for example), or, if the aircraft is VFR, will advise it to "proceed under own navigation", at which point the pilot is free to enjoy all the prerogatives and responsibilities of properly positioning his or her aircraft in three-dimensional space.

The majority of the tour participants were expecting to see communication towers and radar antennas. The Tracon facility has no antennas and, as we found out during the tour, all communications and radar is piped in remotely from antennas located for the most part in the vicinity of the major airports it supportes. This facility also provides training for new air traffic controllers. It has a simulation training room with approximately 10-15 positions on which new air traffic controllers are trained using simulation software. Mark indicated that it can take up to a year to train new air traffic controllers and there is a large washout rate. The new air traffic controllers attend a basic course in Oklahoma before coming to this facility. The air traffic controllers then train on the simulation positions until they are considered qualified to operate active positions. Therefore, the training length for air controllers can vary depending upon an individual's progress. However, those that take too long or don't appear to have the aptitude are washed out. The FAA currently is short of controllers and overtime is frequently required. The shift work, low starting pay, and the pressure of the job results in a large turnover rate.... "Its more enjoyable controlling an airplane from within the cockpit?"
