Safety Is as Safety Does...Think about it

This article is about thinking. Most of you have seen the movie Forrest Gump. Remember “Stupid is as stupid does?” Ever **THINK about what that means? What happens if you do stupid things? You get the consequences of your stupidity. Well, safety is just the opposite. What happens if you are safe? Nothing! That’s safety...no consequences of the negative kind. Thinking is a critical skill for safety. It’s called headwork usually. So I want to take a moment just**

to get everyone thinking a little.

To back up a little, I’ve taken on the job of Safety and Training officer simply because I have some experience as a Navy air squadron safety officer and I suspect I can do some good. Air safety is not my job alone, it’s yours if you are a pilot. I just want to help you do it. I will not be shy about asking for help because we all have or know about situations where we didn’t do too well; the classic “teachable moments” to use a phrase currently in vogue. Don’t keep them to yourself; if you learned something, someone else could benefit to.

Now back to thinking. You may have heard of the 80/20 rule. It seems to apply everywhere in life that 80% of something is caused by 20% of something else. I asked a good friend, who is a trike dealer and was my instructor while transitioning to trikes, to give me his opinion on the 80/20 accident cause factors and how the causes could be avoided. He took my cue and queried the NTSB accident database for accidents/incidents since 2004 involving popular trike models flown in the US. He also has personal knowledge of many accidents and incidents that do not make it into the database. In all but one case where causes were clear, the cause was pilot error. The one case was Jim Gottschalk’s crash, where maintainer error led to an in-flight material failure in a part that was reported defective in a manufacturer’s safety bulletin. So, the conclusion is inescapable. My friend’s answer was basically 100/1, i.e., the record shows 100% human headwork errors and the prevention measure is “Don’t be stupid!” Which means THINK.

Thinking is not a passive thing. There are methodical ways to go about it. AC 60-22 (1991) is about Aeronautical Decision-Making. It says decision-related **accidents** account for 52% of GA fatalities. If you have not looked at AC 60-22 (just Google it), please do it. That information is there because people have repeatedly learned it the hard way and you don’t want to do the same. Now I want to pass along a few tips I’ve learned about aviation-quality thinking over the years.

1. Visualization works. Whatever you are going to do in the air, if you have not done it recently, fly the mission in your head, from preflight to shutdown. **THINK** over everything...mental checklists, radio calls, airport layouts, maneuvers and get it to the front of your brain. If you are not acquainted with this technique, you'll be surprised at how much better you fly. It really helps to prevent stupid mistakes. There is a physiological reason I'm sure: the information is fresh and in the ready-service locker, not the back of your brain covered with dust.

2. Use checklists for important items. I personally use mental versions, but they are designed with an easy to remember key of first letters so I won't skip a step. Be religious about using them. Checklists make you **THINK** without thinking about it. Do you fixed-gear folks use a landing checklist? I do: wind checked, instruments good, no traffic coming the opposite way when on **final**. The last item has been useful more than once.

3. Build up what a friend of mine called "Spidey sense" when something is different from normal. Accidents tend to happen when things are going wrong but the pilot is not waking up to the fact. Either that, or the pilot blithely responds by piling one bad decision on another, not thinking of the hole he/she is digging until too late. Generally, there is a chain of events that occurs before an accident, and the chain could have been broken anywhere in its progress by an alert pilot. (You've all heard of accidents waiting to happen. That just means that step(s) one or more of the chain has been accomplished.) Train yourself to continually **THINK** about what's different today in what you are doing. As soon as you recognize the change, then **THINK** about what can happen because of that. For example, if you've just been doing any little work on your engine, and you are getting ready to fly, expect the **worst on** takeoff until you are sure any uncertainty in the engine's status is back to normal. If you work at it, your Spidey sense will develop and warn when things are different, waking you to a potential accident chain in progress.

Bottom line: Don't be stupid. Learn to deliberately deliberate, i.e. **THINK**.
